


MON SEP 5: PORTSMOUTH PEACE TREATY DAY BELLRINGING IN MARKET SQUARE:



CONSTRUCTION WORK THIS WEEK: For information about each of the seasonal DPW projects now underway, click on the drop-down Projects menu on the DPW page on the City website. **STATE STREET PROJECT DETOURS MAY BE NECESSARY AT TIMES --** Construction from Columbia Street to 683 State Street (near Summer St). Work includes roadway repaving and sidewalk replacement using both brick and concrete. The road resurfacing extends to Middle Street. Paving expected by end of this week. **Work hours are Mon-Fri**, 7 **am to 5 pm with no parking in the marked work zone.** Those who park on the street should move their cars by 7 am or risk being towed. Sidewalk removal and replacement work starts this week and expected to take 6 weeks.







NHDHHS MONKEYPOX INFORMATION --While the CDC has elevated its concern about monkeypox to a national health emergency, NH DHHS says the state is prepared if the outbreak


spreads. **NH DHHS has identified these**

NHDHHS announced on Aug 29 that individuals at a high risk of infection for monkeypox are now eligible for the vaccine, in addition to those who are known exposures to someone with confirmed monkeypox. DHHS also announces that individuals eligible for JYNNEOS, the monkeypox vaccine, can access the vaccine at eight ConvenientMD locations. U.S. health officials on Aug 9 authorized a new strategy that would allow health professionals to vaccinate up to five people instead of one – with each vial. The approach uses just a fraction of the typical amount of vaccine and administers it with an injection just under the skin rather than into deeper tissue. Recipients would still get two shots a month apart. The current outbreak is affecting primarily men ages 20 to 40 who identify as gay, bisexual or men having sex with men. NH DHHS website:


FALL COVID-19 BOOSTER VACCINES RECEIVE FDA AUTHORIZATION – The FDA

has approved EUA for a modified Pfizer vaccine for age 12+ and one from Moderna for 18+ as fall boosters -- more effective against the original strain and the Omicron variant. Dr. Ashish Jha, the White House Covid response coordinator, has said the new shots will become available to the public by early to mid-September. The U.S. government has secured 105 million doses of Pfizer's updated shots and 66 million doses of Moderna's new vaccine.

UPDATED CDC GUIDANCE ON COVID-19

- Stresses the importance of being <u>up to date</u> <u>with vaccination</u> to protect against serious illness, hospitalization and death.
- Recommends against quarantine for anyone exposed to COVID-19. Instead: wear a high-quality mask for 10 days and get tested on day 5.
- Recommends those who have, or suspect they have, COVID-19: stay home for at least 5 days, isolate in your household and wear a mask when around others (through day 10 if you tested positive). You may end isolation when:
 - If tested, you receive a negative test result and

- If after 5 days you are fever-free for 24 hours without the use of medication, and your symptoms are improving, or you never had symptoms,
- If you have contact with people who are more likely to get very sick from COVID-19 that you isolate from them until at least day 11.
- Recommends those who experience <u>moderate</u> <u>illness</u> (shortness of breath or had difficulty breathing) should isolate through day 10.
- Recommends those who had <u>severe illness</u> or have a weakened immune system should consult a doctor before ending isolation.
- Recommends that if symptoms worsen after ending isolation, start another 5 days of isolation.
- Discontinues screening tests for asymptomatic people without known exposures

ENERGY EFFICIENCY TIPS AND PAYMENT HELP – On **Aug 1**, New Hampshire electric supply rates increased to more than double last August's supply rate. This significant rate increase is due to record-high natural gas prices and the global economy. Natural gas is the primary fuel for generating electricity in the region_**Help is available for customers who need it.** Regardless of financial need, customers are eligible for various payment programs and are urged to call Eversource at 844-273-7760 or visit <u>Eversource.com</u>/billhelp to find the right plan for them. EMERGENCY RENTAL & UTILITIES ASSISTANCE – The <u>NH Emergency Rental</u> <u>Assistance Program</u> (NHERAP) provides funds to renters who cannot pay their rent and utilities during the pandemic. The program works with tenants and landlords. Program changes as of October 1, 2021:

- Households may qualify for assistance for past-due and future rent and utility payments for a period <u>not</u> to exceed 18 months.
- At least one person in the household must have qualified for unemployment benefits, had their income reduced, had significant costs, or had other financial hardship <u>during</u> the pandemic. Certain income requirements must be met.

- Past-due rent including reasonable late and legal fees.
- Three months of future rent payments if needed for housing stability.
- Utilities, such as electricity, home heating costs, water, sewer, trash.
- Other housing-related costs such as internet and relocation expenses (including rental application fees, utility hook-up fees, and security deposits).
- Households may qualify for utility assistance even if they do not receive or need rental assistance.
